National Scrap Harvest Now 20-Year Old Shipyard Worker Much Has Been Accomplished Drowning Victim Sunday

Eleven year old Patricia Me-Grath of Bay View street was the discoverer of the body of Leroy Hardy apparently drowned while bathing near the Public Beach Sunday. Hardy had been missing since shortly after 1 block sut which time he had been the beach. On making the discovery of the body floating face wn near shore, Patricia called to Austin Joy, who was on the beach nearby. He immediately sent her for help at nearby homes including the McGraths. ### Celebrated Artists to Give Benefit Concert


