The Camden-Rockport United Charities, an organization formed nearly 20 years ago by Camden and Rockport Summer residents as a means of helping support several worthy causes in this area has contributed during the past two years, \$700 to Rockport's Recreational Area the Arthur Walker Memorial Park

Annual Drive For Multiple Sclerosis Starts Week Of October 3rd

The annual fund drive for Multiple Sclerosis in Camden will be held the week of October 3. Darius D. Joy, Jr., Chairman, states that a house to house canvass will be conducted Monday through Friday and a Tag Day in the business section on Saturday. All persons cooperating with the canvass will be wearing proper identification. Boys and girls of the Drum Corps with proper identification will take part in the Tag Day activities.

What is this disease which nothing has been found to stop and its victims always ending up helpless invalids? Multiple Sclerosis or MS for short is a disease which destroys the hopes and plans of young adults just starting a career or just starting to raise a family. It is as much a mystery as the common cold was to grand dad.

Katherine McFarland, better known as "Kitty" of Camden, is cooperating with Mr. Joy in planning the MS campaign. She is thirty-six years of age and the wife of Lloyd McFarland. They have two children, Freddie, 10, and Debbie, 7.

Kitty graduated from Camden High School in 1942 and attended a business college for one year. She is Past Matron of the Seaside Chapter of the O. E. S. and a member of Megunticook Grange. She is also a den mother of the Cub Scouts and assistant Sunday School teacher of the First Baptist Church.

Kitty is an MS patient and the following is her own expression of her experience with this disease.

"Six years ago, the only way I knew anything about Multiple Sclerosis was what I had read in magazines, never dreaming that it could happen to me. Now, I've asked myself, 'Why?' They call it a Mystery Sickness striking young adults between the ages of 20 - 40.

At the first of it, I would have terrible headaches and having double vision. Thinking I might need to wear glasses, I went to see an Optometrist but was told to see a Medical Doctor. From there, I went to the Portland Hospital undergoing examinations and treatments, still not knowing the cause even after several trips for check-ups.

After several months went by, I was fine again and went back to work at Yorkies. Everything was going along just great and was feeling in the best of health. Then I started staggering, dropping articles, and losing my balance. Again I went back to my Doctor. All this time I suspected I might possibly have MS but didn't want to believe it, therefore, I never asked because I was afraid of the truth. Fear can be a terrible thing.

As time went on everything began

running smoothly again. I became more active and was back at work doing what I enjoy doing very much, meeting the public, until that last night. I found it very difficult giving customers the service they should receive and having much difficulty in walking. Then the following morning, I awoke early and couldn't get out of bed without falling. I had lost all control of my movements. That was when I was taken to the wheelchair.

Learning to accept the situation as it was and is, was my hardest task. After accepting it, things haven't been nearly as bad. I now consider myself very lucky. My husband and children have been very understanding. With their help and the help of the medicine I have been receiving, I am now out of the wheelchair and able to get about, hoping again to go to work, this time, doing what I would be capable of doing. Keeping the mind busy helps so very much.

The money raised from the Fund Drives are spent on research to find the cause of Multiple Sclerosis and, eventually the cure. What it is?

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VA Claims Name Alone Is Not Enough

Far too many of the 50,000 pieces of mail that flow through the Togus Center of the Veterans Administration each year cannot be properly identified, Dr. Joseph Weltman, Manager, disclosed today.

Too many veterans and their dependents merely sign their names to correspondence, and names are not enough.

Almost all of the 110,000 names in the VA Togus Office master index file are duplicated. As might be expected, there are almost 350 Poulain's 800 Clark's and more than 500 Wilson's and 1,200 Smith's, but most other names are duplicated scores of times.

The veteran's claim number or "C-number" and his insurance number are his alone, Dr. Weltman pointed out. Inclusion of these numbers in correspondence will insure prompt and efficient service, and save the time and cost of additional correspondence.

If the veteran's "C-number" or insurance number is not known, he should include his service serial number and date of birth, Dr. Weltman advised.

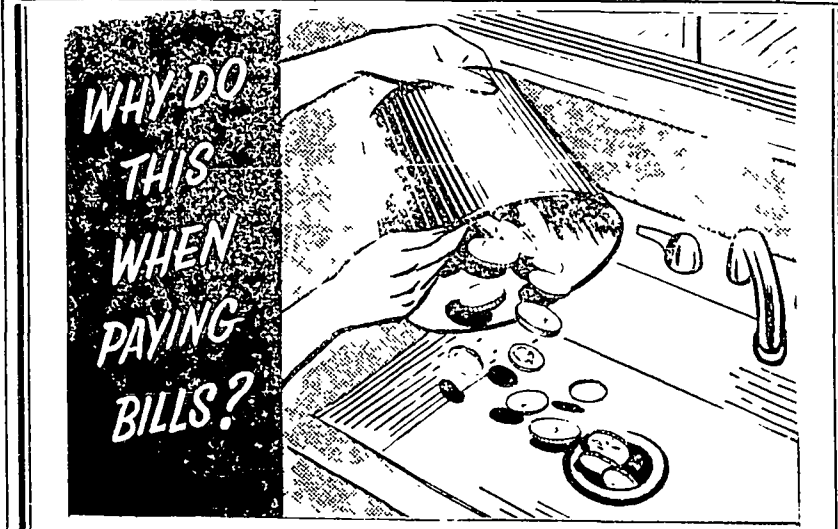
During the day mothers with children can check their obligations.
